We strive to preserve our standards and principles and provide our children with a holiday during which they will refresh their batteries, enjoy quality family and friend time, and prepare themselves mentally and emotionally for the new school year.

Reminiscing about holidays takes me back many, many years to the time when I was in summer camp, entrusted with the beautiful responsibility of *shomering* the milk on a local farm. What an educational opportunity, to learn the halachos, appreciate the responsibility, and savour those first sips of the kosher milk I had helped bring to the table!

Holidays offer **חינוך** opportunities. **חינוך**, after all is a state of being, not an isolated lesson taught.

I remember entrusting my own daughter with this same **מצוה**, when our family was at the seaside. The children would watch enthralled as we fine-tuned out koshering the holiday rental's kitchen in under an hour, explaining each activity until we were done, then enjoying a strictly kosher repast that always tasted better than anything cooked in our own large, well-appointed kitchen at home.

Days spent in rest and relaxation are anything but empty time; use those precious hours to talk about all those issues you are eager to explain in depth but never have the time. Debate those hot topics you never found the right moment for. Let the children pit their wits against you in contests and riddles, in **משניות** marathons or plain **ידיעות כלליות**. Talk about **קידוש ה'** and our chance to make an impact while away from home.

Quality time isn't something we create; ALL time is quality time in my book. It depends only on the way we use it.

And as I pen these last lines the rides home in a packed car come to mind. THANK YOU GIRLS, YOU HAVE DONE US IMMENSELY PROUD

YEAR 11' IN POLAND – 4TH – 7TH JULY 2016

Following a week of inspirational שינויים, lessons about the history of Polish Jewry, a historical perspective about the rise of Nazism and the Holocaust, year 11 pupils, accompanied by Mrs Stefansky, Miss Dome, Mrs Royde and Mrs Kessler embarked on a school trip which none of us will ever forget. Among the places we visited were Lublin, Lizhensk, Tarnow, Krakow and Warsaw.

None of us will ever forget visiting Majdanek and Birkenau which evoked such painful memories about the loss of six million members of כלל ישראל or seeing the memorial to the 800 young Jewish children who were murdered deep in the Tarnow forest. How can we forget the powerful rendition of קדיש by an Israel chazzan beside our Yahrzeit candles on the train tracks at Birkenau? Nor will we forget that sense of the fear we all experienced in the cattle truck at Radegast train station when a train sped past us and shook the cattle truck we were standing in.

Equally, we will always remember the כוונה with which we davened and said תהלים throughout our trip: whether this was in the Rema's shul, the Nozyk shul or at the קברים of the נעם אלמלך, the Netziv, The Rema, The Megale Amukos and Soroh Schneirer, and the lively singing and dancing, our own hakofos very late at night at the Lancut shul.

At the memorial to the Warsaw Ghetto uprising, we discussed the notion of real strength in the face of adversity. We asked each of our girls what they had learned during their time in Poland and how it was likely to influence them in the future. One girl said that she would remember the inspiration of Soroh Schenirer – someone who had a dream which many people felt was unattainable. Yet she was undeterred and she set up the Beis Yaakov school system we have today. The message from this was clear – we need to have ambition and work hard to achieve our goals no matter what obstacles people may put in the way.

Another pupil commented on the sense of אחדות/unity among our group. Everyone had something to contribute and everyone's contribution was felt to be equally important. Other pupils spoke about how they were going to try to live 'על קידוש ה', to honour the memory of those who had died 'על קידוש ה'. The list goes on. ..

Year 11 have now left our school but the memory of these four days in Poland will never be forgotten.

SEFIRAS HAOMER – A TIME FOR SELF IMPROVEMENT

Following on from Dr Bernstein's visit to school straight after Pesach, internationally renowned author and mechanech, Rabbi Kaplin also visited our school just before Lag b'Omer. Using humour and anecdotes which everyone could relate to, Rabbi Kaplin spoke of how much we benefit when we consider other people's needs and feelings above our own.

Of all the examples he gave, the following two stories resonated most with the girls. The story concerned the Gaon, Rabbi Moshe Feinstein ז"ל. On one occasion when he was walking in the yeshiva building, a yeshiva bochur was sliding down the bannister

and accidentally banged into Rabbi Feinstein. Rabbi Feinstein's response was not to berate the bochur for his carelessness but to apologise to him for invading his personal space!

The second story concerned a baal teshuva's visit to his rav. A baal teshuva visited his rav one Shabbos afternoon. Absentmindedly, he rang on the rav's door bell. So that he didn't embarrass his visitor, the rav pretended to be so fast asleep that he 'didn't hear the doorbell'. He only awoke when he heard loud knocking on his door.

Rabbi Kaplin concluded his talk by encouraging those present to look at ways and the situations in which they could also be more aware and responsive to someone else's feelings, whether they knew the person or not.

MORE BEAUTIFUL ART WORK FROM YEAR 11

הכנסת ספר תורה and Preparation for שבועות

As a preparation for זמן מתן תורתנו, Beis Yaakov High school prepared their own mini mock תורה ספר on חודש סיון.

On the previous day, Monday, Mrs Stefansky spoke in assembly, explaining the significance of a תורה ספר הכנסת and going through each component. She linked it to קבלת התורה and the girls therefore understood its connection to this time of year.

On Tuesday, ראש חודש, Years 7 & 8 were honoured to be addressed by Rabbi D Benarroch שליט"א who explained the work of a סופר and brought in many examples for the girls to see and experience first hand. Both classes were sorry that Rabbi Benarroch was not able to stay longer as they gained so much from his presentation.

This was followed by the mock תורה ספר הכנסת. Fourth form programme team had worked hard to prepare mock תורה ספר and a חופה. They started a procession from the corner of the upper corridor, and moved along the corridor, singing and dancing and being joined along the way by other waiting classes. Even the crèche joined in, waving their specially prepared flags. The procession continued through the car park and down into the internal playground, where another 2 mock תורה ספר greeted them, and the traditional פרקי תהלים were led by Mrs Reif.

The girls continued into the hall, where a small "reception" had been set up and 4th form led "הקפות" followed by a Kumtitz outside. The afternoon finished with מנחה and the distribution of Pekelech!

On we were privileged to hear Rabbi Roodyn שליט"א, director of Project Chazon and a noted speaker, speak to years 3 and 4 on Revelation at סיני. Guiding us through the relevant פסוקים he showed us how B'nei Yisroel themselves witnessed Hashem's presence and recognised Moshe Rabbeinu's role as Hashem's messenger. Thus our claim to Divine Revelation is stronger than other faiths' because Matan Torah happened in public with all of B'nei Yisroel as witness. Rabbi Roodyn's stimulating delivery prompted several searching questions from our students and his shiur was an altogether uplifting preparation for Shevuos.

Citizenship is now part of year 8 and year 10's timetable. These groups have had a very busy year: guest speakers, outings and a little work in between!

The main focus of this year's work has been careers. Year 8 heard a range of guest speakers explain their chosen careers. These included Mr D Kasmir who explained his work in recruitment and his charity work, Mrs E Halpern who is a podiatrist, Mr Topperman - a solicitor and a school governor. Mrs N Green explained the work she does at the Beis Din, while Mr Burns of Hatzolo gave a talk about his work and gave the girls a demonstration of emergency lifesaving techniques.

Year 8's outings included a visit to a recycling plant where they saw what happens to all our waste and a visit to the Police Museum when they studied the law and its history.

Year 10's speakers included Mrs Feinstein who is a barrister and whose husband is a judge. Another speaker was Mr N Younger who spoke to the girls about the economy and employment and workplace law.

Year 10 enjoyed an outing to the Houses of Parliament. The girls went into the House of Commons and they also stood beside the Queen's throne in the House of Lords. They also saw our country's legal system in operation when they saw actual court cases in session in Manchester Crown Court and Manchester Magistrates Court.

Anyone who would like to come and speak to either or both of the Citizenship groups about their area of work/expertise/special interest would be more than welcome.

It all started with Lexi

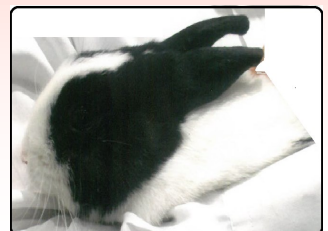
